Dear

I follow up on your message below that the NGT consultation targets EU stakeholders and that PRRI is not considered an EU stakeholder because the majority of PRRI members are based in institutions of non-EU-countries.

I confirm that most PRRI members are public sector scientists from non-EU countries, mainly developing countries and countries with economies in transition.

After sharing your message with PRRI members, I received the following questions and observations about the selection process and the survey:

Questions:

- How is 'EU level stakeholder' defined?
- How was the list of targeted stakeholders compiled?
- Why are some international organisations considered 'EU level stakeholders', while others are not?

Observations about the selection process:

- it seems a missed opportunity to exclude organisations such as PRRI, which through the many members from EU countries harbour substantial and experience relevant to the study that the Council requested,

- it seems a missed opportunity to exclude organisations such as PRRI, which through the many members from non-EU countries have experience with non-EU regulations that may be valuable for the study, for example to learn from and compare with regulatory experiences and to understand the impact of choices made in the EU on the potential for public research innovation in developing countries.

Observation about the survey:

The request of the Council was for a study on the status of organisms developed through new genomic techniques under Union Law. However, none of the questions in the survey ask this - open - question. Moreover, several questions seem steer the answers in a certain direction by suggesting that all NGTs are GMOs under Union Law.

I look forward to receiving your replies to these questions and observations.

That said, I also inform you that I will not insist for a third time for PRRI to be included in the targeted stakeholder consulted. Instead, PRRI will share its views on biotechnology and regulation in a letter to the Presidents of the European Commission, the European Parliament, and the European Council.

| 1) none of the listed organisations look at public research as a whole (e.g. academia, government research institutes, international research institutes) and at genomic techniques as a whole. |
| 2) moreover, while PRRI is indeed active on the EU level, it is also active on the international level and can therefore bring a very relevant perspective to the consultation, i.e. the perspective of public researchers in developing countries on the potential of the various genomic technique to contribute to sustainable development and the impact of EU policies and regulations on public research in developing countries. |


