> I am enclosing reports on <u>d</u>-dlhydro-LSD, <u>l</u>-Methyld-lysergic acid butanolamide, and elymoclavine. The first two are materials received from the Sandoz Company. Neither seems of particularly great interest at the moment. D-dihydro-LSD is about one-third as potent as LSD, whereas l-Methyl-d-lysergic acid butanolamide is not a psychotomimetic. Elymoclavine is of some interest since, like agroclavine, it induces sedative effects in man, and may in fact be more potent than agroclavine or Lilly 23194.

We plan to do a dose-effect curve with this latter material, provided an additional supply can be obtained, and to compare it directly with secobarbital.
